There is a great sense of accomplishment and joy in a well-tended garden. Its beauty and peace, fragrances and delights make all the effort worthwhile. When God blesses your life with new growth and fragrant gifts, take time to enjoy them and give thanks to our God who delights to give generously to His children for their enjoyment (1 Timothy 6:17). We must accept with as much maturity God's appointed season of singing as we did His seasons of sighing and sowing.

The Deal Killer

Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. Ephesians 4:32 (NIV)

"Forgive."

Think about most modern teaching on forgiveness. It focuses on the various personal benefits of forgiving others, the private emotional detriments of withholding forgiveness or the long-term physiological side effects of carrying a grudge against some offender.

But strangely, Jesus never mentioned these things—any of them.

Without the aid of these novel psychological constructs, Jesus decisively delivers his Father's directive concerning forgiveness, through a disturbing little tale we know as "The Parable of the Unmerciful Servant."

You remember...after a certain man's blinding debt load is compassionately canceled forever, he is immediately discovered cruelly denying similar relief to an associate who owed him a mere trifle. When news reached the good and forgiving King, he stood and shook the great hall with this wrathful indictment:

"You wicked servant! I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?" Matthew 18:32,33 (NKJV)

Forgiveness, from the Greek aphiemi, literally is to send away, to free from demand for repayment. Think about what that means. Anyone who forgives chooses to absorb the cost, to incur the loss. A forgiver is one who estimates the damage and deliberately elects to bear the expense of it himself; he assumes that burden and releases his debtor from all its claims.

This is an incredible gesture of selflessness and compassion.

And while we might expect to occasionally find this type of noble action among beneficent rulers, surely we would not expect it to be common among the rest of us mortals. The fascinating reality, however, is that now there seems to emerge a clear, divine expectation. As a result of our freely bestowed mercy, we now have an obligation, a duty or responsibility newly imposed on us: we are morally obligated to forgive others as we ourselves have been forgiven.

Although we cannot not be expected to "work up" this kind of forgiveness under our

own steam, it seems that once we have been forgiven of our enormous debt—so freely given simply because we asked—it is expected that we should behave the selfsame way toward those who commit comparably little offenses against us. It has become for us more than a benevolent option for those who would go the "extra mile;" it is somehow a mandate, a requirement, a moral imperative. And failure to extend mercy under these circumstances has been given a new name: wickedness.

God is setting a new theological benchmark here. A person who has been shown mercy yet refuses to show mercy to his fellowman—this, God says, is wickedness. Wickedness is being shown kindness yet not allowing His kindness to lead us to repentance. (Romans 2:1-4)

Appreciate the stark contrast. Compare the big-hearted willingness of the King, who gladly bears the loss of his personal resources, to a petty, small-minded, self-absorbed servant who's not big enough to shoulder a few dollars'

loss - or even to extend the deadline a bit! This is not just moral carelessness; it's true wickedness.

By withholding forgiveness from anyone, we expose the wickedness in our petty hearts and cause God to repent for having shown us such mercy. This is a classic example of an instance where previously granted grace is revoked at the King's command. On what basis? The seed of grace has failed to find purchase: the heart has refused to be changed by the wonderful grace freely bestowed upon it. Let us tremble as we see the good King wrathfully revoke an agreement-which was previously free, final and eternally binding-and reinstate the full debt. Just as we have judged, so we will be judged.

Scripture is clear: while our willingness to forgive others could never be considered a condition of receiving forgiveness, our unwillingness is held out as sort of a cosmic "deal-killer". It is proof that God's grace was to us without effect and that our hearts were never genuinely transformed. It also puts us in imminent danger of hearing the King's call to reinstate our freely pardoned debt.

In anger his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed. "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart." Matthew 18:34-35 (NIV)

Jesus' words here deserve no cushion or dilution; they are best taken full-strength to produce in us a renewal of awe and profound gratitude. How helpful it is to be reminded of the dread and great peril we have narrowly escaped, the exhilarating rush of relief when our debt was canceled and the joy we now have from a clean, forgiven heart.

And the only valid expression of this joy is not judgment on our brother, but rather a yearning to see him set free, to share this great joy and to faithfully exercise the high privilege we have been granted to extend this same relief to another.

Our Master is not urging us gently here, but rather warning us sternly. Dare we withhold forgiveness even another hour?

The Beauty of God Mitch

A.W. Tozer, in his book, <u>The Pursuit of God</u>, speaks of the "gaze of the soul". This is a profound phrase because it touches on an aspect of our relationship with God that goes far beyond the realm of human comprehension into the realm that, in a manner of speaking, could conceivably be called "the depths of the beauty of God". This beauty is not something to be merely understood or talked about—it is something for the heart to behold. Think about the difference between knowing that there is a Grand Canyon and standing at the edge of it in wonder. Our relationship with God is like that. Good theology and teaching are important and they give us a mental framework to understand the things that God has revealed in His Word, but good teaching cannot make the heart believe. I think that when we are satisfied with just understanding, that we do not understand anything at all; we fall short of the very intent of the revealed word of God: to truly know God. This is the truth that sets free (John 8:32) and the kind of mind-renewing that transforms (Romans 12:2). In fact, Jesus rebuked the Pharisees for searching the scriptures, but not coming to Him for life. (John 5:39)

The capacity of our spirits to absorb the beauty of God will only grow as we drink in the living water of the Holy Spirit. The heart that is satisfied with less than the wholehearted pursuit of God faces the dangers readily found in the shallows of mediocrity, where the heart and mind are so easily bogged down with the worries and distractions of life. Mediocrity is everywhere. Mediocrity



makes us content with less and makes us obsessed with self. To be mediocre is to trade eternal pleasures for dirt. The Lord is eager to show us His love and shed abroad that same love in our hearts. He wants to give us power to grasp how great an inheritance we have in Jesus (Ephesians 1:17-18) and make us understand that no mind has conceived, no ear has heard what God has prepared for those that love Him. (I Corinthians 2:9) Yet He reveals it to us by His Spirit.



Vincent Skinner World Revival Ministries

Vincent Skinner had a call on his life to preach the Gospel from the age of twelve. He had many personal encounters with the Holy Spirit that cultivated a deep hunger in his life for God. In the 1990's, Vincent and Lisa Skinner founded World Revival Ministries. Vincent's ministry is distinguished by the passion for souls and the Presence of God. He ministers prophetically as well as in

the power and demonstration of the Holy Spirit, drawing many to salvation, healing the sick and setting the captives free. (Luke 4: 18)

Philippians 3:3 has been a motto for his personal service before the Lord, "For we are the circumcision, who worship God in the Spirit, rejoice in Christ Jesus, and have no confidence in the flesh..." (NKJV) He has ministered in the USA and abroad, in Europe, Brazil, Austria, Africa, Central and South America.

One of my favorite miracles was of a Brazilian teenage boy with extreme allergies that manifested as horrible sores on his arms. The boy testified, "During the ministry I was worshiping God and I felt heat come on them (arms), and when I looked I was astonished

that the sores went away as I watched. It was like an iron went up my arm and ironed them away, right before my eves!"

An amazing thing happened in Central America where Vincent was ministering in a chapel jail. Once a week a minister would come and give the salvation message to those in the jail, with little results. Knowing this, Vincent decided to preach a very short salvation message, and then let the men meet the One he

spoke about. So he said, "Now I would like to show you that God is real. would like three volunteers to come up." No one came forward, so he challenged them, "Come on, I dare you to come up!" So three of the biggest and meanest looking convicts came up to the front, with hard looks and faces. Then Vincent spoke, "Holy Spirit, touch them now!" As soon as he uttered this, the three men violently dropped to the floor and one of them cried out, "Jesus, save me!" The other men began shouting and crying out to God. Everyone wanted to be prayed for. Even the convicts outside the chapel started running to get in. Because of all the screaming, the guards thought that they were killing Vincent and ran to help only to find instead that Vincent was praying for the convicts. Many were saved and healed that day when God demonstrated His love and power, and confirmed His word with signs and wonders.

See, a king will reign in righteousness and rulers will rule with justice. Each man will be like a shelter from the wind and a refuge from the storm, like streams of water in the desert and the shadow of a great rock in a thirsty land. Then the eyes of those who see will no longer be closed, and the ears of those who hear will listen. The mind of the rash will know and understand, and the stammering tongue will be fluent and clear. Isaiah 32:1-4 (NIV)

The most familiar prophetic picture given to us at Northlands is that we are an oasis of the Spirit.
